# **Parish Christmas Donation Project**

This year we will be supporting two charities:
The St. Vincent de Paul Society and
Christian Corner Community Center

Both of these organizations serve the poor & needy in the area. St. Vincent de Paul Society provides for the needs of over 100 households. Their list of needs includes any item found in the grocery story, except fresh or frozen foods or refrigerated foods. They need any canned or boxed foods, cereals, cake mixes, cookies, household items, soaps, shampoo, and detergents. Think of any items you need in your family.

For the Christian Corner Community Center, you can adopt a family by providing an Essential Gift Bag. It includes things we take for granted and no one thinks of. By providing those items, it will help that family have a little extra money to get a loved one something they have wanted all year, but were not able to afford. Items for the Essential Gift Bag include toilet paper, paper towels, kleenex, deodorant, soap, shampoo, conditioner, laundry soap, socks of all sizes, diapers of all sizes and large Depends. They ask that those items be put in either a laundry basket or a basket of some kind that they can use and not throw away. The Center also provides a meal everyday for 50 to 100 people and hands out 50 food boxes a month. If you would like to make a cash donation, both of these organizations are 501 (c)(3).

These items can be dropped off during the Drive-by/Walk-by Live Nativity on December 6 (on the provided wagons on the grounds of St. Michael's Church) or in church.



# From the Desk of Fr. Mark

Hi, everyone. As I write this on December 3, it would have been my mom's 103rd birthday. I can't imagine my mom getting ready for Christmas. In the midst of trying to put Christmas together for a family of 17, my mom would still milk the cows in the morning and do fancywork (embroidery) at night. I can't tell you how many cookies a big family goes through. Mom would bake fruitcake cookies, pinwheels, pixies, pecan balls and enough sugar cut out cookies to feel a small army (that's right, we were a small army). And then there was the decoration of cookies and tree. The tinsel had to be put on just right...it was the same tinsel that we saved from previous Christmases.

The tinsel was about the only thing which had to be perfect. Mom was very simple in so many ways. The cookies and tree were decorated by us kids and came out age appropriate. The cookies were anything but perfect, as broken legs of shepherds were quickly eaten by small decorators. I can't tell you how many broken angel wings were devoured by devilish children. Maybe that is why I turned out a little on the ornery side. I don't believe I got to eat an entire angel sugar cookie in all the years of decorating cookies.

Mom was simple in ways of life. If we couldn't grow it in our garden, it didn't make the table. As a family, we had lots of meat and potatoes. I still remember when my sister came home from college and made lasagna. Mom was pretty skeptical when noodles had to be purchased. She liked it and became a special meal...but mom still preferred her meat and potatoes. Our family didn't go out to a restaurant, but when we did, mom ordered roast beef and potatoes.

I believe that as complicated as a family of 17 can be, simplicity was what held us together. We played gambling card games for a penny and then returned the coins to a penny jar. We never ran out of money or fun, as we played many games. Mom made sure that we all knew how to pray. We would teach children at the kitchen table the simple prayers of the Our Father, Hail Mary and Glory Be. Those simple prayers were prayed at every meal...before and after our meat and potatoes.

Mom even dressed very simply. She nearly always had everyday dresses in which she would do her chores. I don't believe mom ever made it style wise to wear a pair of blue jeans. Those simple dresses lasted forever, as now when we look at pictures, mom was always pictured in the same couple of dresses.

What made life simple for mom was that she knew what was important. We all knew how important God was in her life. Pictures of the Sacred Heart or Last Supper hung on the walls. People were important in mom's world. With a handicapped daughter, mom made sure we all knew that even though Helen could not talk, eat by herself or go to the restroom by herself, that she was loved. All people deserved to be loved. It was as simple as that.

As the world gets ready for the complicated season of Christmas, perhaps we need to become simple. Jesus came in the simplicity of a child, in the simplicity of a stable with simple parents. But what was most important came forth from that stable. God showed His love to all people in the simplicity of His Son. Have a blessed week. *Fr. Mark*
