Fr. Nathan's Eucharistic Article 19 of 40

"Vested in his magnificent robes, and wearing his garments of splendor, as he ascended the glorious altar and lent majesty to the court of the sanctuary" (Sir 50:11)

These inspired words from the author of Sirach, depict the appearance of the high-priest at the Temple during the Old Testament period. Vestments have a long history in our liturgies, and their original usage can be traced back to first priests during the Exodus (Ex 28). Even St. John envisions them being symbolically used in the Heavenly worship: "they have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb. For this reason they stand before God's throne and worship him day and night in his temple" (Rev. 7:14-15). So, what's the point behind their usage? In general, they are meant to draw our attention away from the ordinary to the extraordinary. They are reserved to priests within a liturgical setting in order to emphasize the uniqueness of what is happening. In the context of Mass, that is representation of Jesus' sacrifice on the Cross. Each has its own unique symbolism, and while I will articulate how the priest is to think of it, all of us are encouraged to take its symbolism to heart as well.

Roman Cassock: A tradition of the Church dating to the 5th



Cassock: A tradition of the Church dating to the 5th century, is the usage of the Cassock during a liturgical rite. This is the first garb that is used, that goes from the shoulders to the ankles. For priests it is black, monsignors and bishops it is purple, cardinals it is red, and the pope wears white. All clerics begin with "black" as it is meant to encourage him to spiritually think of dying to self and living for our Lord, for as Jesus said "if anyone wishes to come after me, he must deny himself and take up his cross daily and follow me" (Lk

9:23). The traditional design has 33 buttons from top to bottom, in honor of the 33 years of Jesus's life. Thus, the priest is invited to think how he is in communion with our Lord.

<u>Amice</u>: This is the first official vestment and its practical purpose is to cover the roman collar of the cassock. The desire is for none of the priest's daily clerical garb to be seen, as to emphasize the extraordinariness of what is to take place within



the liturgy. This vestment is a square piece within the liturgy. This vestment is a square piece of white linen that goes around the priest's neck. Its name is derived from the Latin verb amicire, which means "to cover." Its spiritual symbolism is meant to draw our attention to St. Paul's "helmet of salvation" (Eph 6:17). St. Paul encourages us to fight against the attacks of evilness, and so put on a "helmet" of grace in this effort. Consequently, as the priest vests, he is to be mindful of his efforts in warding off evilness.

<u>Alb</u>: This is the long white vestment that covers the rest of the cassock. Its name comes from the medie-val Latin *alba*, which means "white." This color is meant to symbolize purity, and so it is to be worn by all those at the altar. In turn, it challenges the priest to be completely pure and clean of heart.

<u>Cincture</u>: This is the cord that is fastened around the waist of the priest. In the Bible, when someone is encouraged to "gird themselves" (e.g. Lk 12:15, Eph 6:14), it is done in connection to acts of labors, warfare, and pilgrimage. The idea being to fasten their loose clothing so that they can move with ease. In turn, the priest is challenged to be effective and efficient in his work for our Lord.



<u>Maniple</u>: This is the vestment that hangs off the left arm of the priest. It has largely fell out of use, but it never was abolished. Its original purpose was to serve as a handkerchief that would be used to wipe the sweat of the priest's brow during Mass. Thus, its purpose was connected to the la-




borers of the priests. Its name, too, points to labor, as it is a Latin word for a "sheaf" of wheat (e.g. Ps 126:6), which is the bundling of wheat after harvest. Thus, the priest is challenged to carry out his duties with zeal and pray for the fruit of his labor.

Stole: This is the vestment that hangs around the neck of the

priests. Its name is a Greek word derived from the early Greek word for towel (*stolas*), and so it points to service. Early Christian writers, in fact, attached to it the symbolism of Christ washing the feet of the Twelve. As part of this service, it also points to the sacramental and teaching authority bestowed on the cleric for the people. Thus, the priest is encouraged to be mindful of his service towards those entrusted to his care.

Chasable: This is the vestment that is most easily seen, as it

is the most outer garment that hangs over the body of the priest. Its name is rooted in the Latin *casula meaning "little cottage" or "hooded cloak"* ... the idea being that it overcast the entire life of the priest. Its symbolism is that of our Lord's love, which leads Him to the Cross ... thus the priest, too, is led to the altar by charity. Because of this symbolism, it is always to be worn over the stole since it represents the charity of Christ which "covers all things" (Col 3:14). Historically, there has been a wide



Finally, a note on the **Colors**:

-white – symbolizes joy, exuberance, celebration, victory, purity, innocence. Thus, it is for solemnities and feasts of our Lord and Our Lady, saints, and festive seasons.

-red – symbolizes the "fire" of the holy spirit (cf. Acts 2:3) and the blood of martyrdom. Thus, it's for Pentecost, Palm Sunday, Good Friday, apostles, evangelists, and martyrs.

-violet – as a "heavier" color, it symbolizes sorrow, mourning, repentance, and penance. Thus, it's for Lent and Advent.

-green – a classic symbol of hope, everlasting life, and fidelity. Thus it is used for the "ordinary" times of our liturgical calendar.

-rose – as it's a mix between white and violet, it symbolizes subdued joy. Thus it is used for the third Sunday of Advent and fourth Sunday of Lent, since the celebration of Christmas and Easter is right around the corner.

-black – symbolizes mourning and death. Thus, it is reserved for All Souls day and funerals. **Fr. Nathan**
