

Fr. Nathan's Eucharistic **Article 7 of 40**

"Father, into your hands I commend my spirit"

So what do we know so far: (1) to reach our potential we need God in the picture; (2) we have the capacity to kick God out of the picture with our sin; (3) to heal any broken relationship some kind of sacrifice is needed by the offenders; (4) no human sacrifice could be adequate considering the gravity of what it means to offend God; (5) pretending like the offense never happened would deny our free will, ultimately being uncharitable to us, and be unjust; (6) so to solve this problem for our sake the Father sent the Son; (7) Jesus' sacrifice of Himself is of infinite value and in a real infinite amount of Grace was made available by that action since His nature is divine; (8) Jesus also is able to make the sacrifice on behalf of humanity since He also had a human nature; (9) with Jesus' sacrifice we now have access to the love/grace than can restore our relationship with God. Alright, one question remains: how do we access the treasury of graces earned by Jesus' sacrifice? It's the Mass!

At the Last Supper, Jesus instituted the sacramental elements of the Mass and connected them to His physical sacrifice the next day on Good Friday. The actions and signs of Jesus at the Last Supper are not simply symbols; rather, they are sacramental, which means they contain and provide grace ... the grace won from the sacrifice of the Cross. The Mass is not a new sacrifice; rather, it is a representation the Sacrifice of the Cross! In other words, Jesus Himself made the essential actions and motions of the Mass to be effective signs that represents the Sacrifice of the Cross. Remember, because Jesus Himself was sacrificed and He is Divine, His sacrifice is of infinite value ... the Mass is that mechanism that puts us in touch with this infinite treasury of grace. How do we know this?

Let's consider Jesus' own words at the Last Supper, "Take and eat, this is my body...drink from it, all of you, for this is my blood of the covenant, which will be shed on behalf of many for the forgiveness of sins" (MT 26:26-28; cf. MK 14:22-24, LK 22:19-20). Notice first, it's no longer ordinary bread and wine, its now sacramental, as its essence becomes the body and blood of Jesus. Secondly, Jesus connects His sacrifice with the motions of the Last Supper when He says this wine is His blood being shed. Keep in mind that the Last Supper was celebrated in the context of a Passover meal (MT 26:17; MK 14:12; LK 22:7; JN 13:1), indicating that Jesus is the true and definitive Lamb that will get us out of slavery and to the Promised Land. Thirdly, we can be connected most fully to Jesus' sacrificial act by consuming the sacrament of His body and blood ... hence why He says to eat it and drink it, in other words make it a part of you. This is akin to the Israelites applying the blood of the lamb to their home before the Exodus—now we have the Lamb of God! To be clear, this is not simply going through the motions; rather, it's physically consuming the sacrament and making communion with our Lord in our hearts at the same time! It's a time to fully engage our body and soul, just like Jesus did during His own sacrifice, so that we can more fully experience the power of this sacrifice. One can sense the apostles even struggled with this at the Last Supper considering their weakness during the Agony of the Garden, and they all bailed on Jesus (except John) at the foot of the cross.

To recap: (A) the sacrifice of Jesus is only one event: it began at the Last Supper and was completed on Calvary; (B) it is represented to us at Mass through Jesus' establishment of sacramental signs; (C) we need access to the power of this sacrifice if we want to reach our full potential; and (D) we can access this power through our sincere and reverent participation at Mass. Why sincere and reverent? Because we are simply following Jesus' model on the cross when He tells the Father, "Into your hands I commend my spirit" (LK 23:46).


